Easter Tops Christmas Every Time!

Many none church goers probably think the highest point of the year for Christians is Christmas. They couldn't be more wrong – it's Easter!

Over the many centuries, the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas has been totally hijacked by frivolity and fun (nothing wrong with these as such), and more importantly commercialism.

The tradition of swapping presents at this festive season has now become a multimillion pound business or billion pound business if you take in the spending all over the world. Christmas presents and parties are publicised months ahead of the season and many families end up in debt afterwards as children's presents become more sophisticated and expensive.

The trouble with Christmas today is that most of the population of the country has forgotten the reason for the season a long time ago. As for Easter, that probably remains a complete mystery to most people.

So for none Christians, it's all about chocolate eggs and bunnies. For followers of Jesus, Easter has the most important significance and meaning. In Paul's letter to the people of the church

at Corinth he puts it as plainly as he could when he wrote that without the resurrection of Jesus, the true celebration of Easter, then our faith is completely meaningless.

If the death of Jesus on a cross had been the final event in his life, there would simply be no Christian church at all today. People claiming to be the saviour or the Messiah had been killed and their followers scattered and that was the end of their movement. But the followers of Jesus had run away when Jesus was made a prisoner and cruelly put to death. However, a number had witnessed his crucifixion and had been heartbroken.

But Jesus had always promised his followers that he would rise again after being killed by the authorities and that is exactly what happened three days after his crucifixion. The first people to witness the resurrection of Jesus when he came to life again were some of his women followers and it was they who rushed to tell the male disciples what had happened.

Right at the core of the Christian faith is the belief that Jesus, the Son of God, died his death on the cross to take away



our sins, taking all the punishment and condemnation on himself. By rising from the dead he also proved that not only had he conquered sin and its guilt, but another great burden the fear of death.

We are told that Jesus was the first fruit of the resurrection, which means that for all who believe in him, they too will be resurrected and will move on to have eternal life with God. In this future life there will be no more pain or suffering, but sheer joy in the presence of God.

When Jesus died on the cross, his disciples had lost all hope and perhaps planned to return to their previous lives before they met him. But when they encountered the risen Lord Jesus on a number of occasions, they could not but tell people what they had witnessed and soon the numbers of followers began to increase.

Of course, the followers of Jesus would not have been able to spread the good news of the resurrection of Jesus if they had not been given the help of the Holy Spirit, but that is another story and another great feast of the Church at Pentecost, the birthday of the church.

For the past 2,000 years Christians throughout the world have prepared themselves to mark the death and resurrection of Jesus through the period of Lent with prayers and fasting. And in the very early days of the Church, people were taught all about the faith during Lent and then were baptised on Easter Sunday.

It is wonderful that commercialism has not taken over Easter and for those who believe we can celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus undistracted by the trappings of this material world in which we live.




THE RESURRECTION OF THE DEAD (1 CORINTHIANS 15: 12-14)

A set of jump leads go into a pub.


The barman says I will serve you but don't start anything.
