We donned our tutu's and so began a marvellous day full of laughter, friendship, music, lots of cake, oh and lots and lots of walking! Thanks to the sound system that Mark carried in his backpack, we



walked all day to the sounds of ELO and disco music. The music set the pace as we strode along. Our next stop was Croston Methodist and we were greeted by a fabulous banner wishing us luck plus tea and cake. We were already in need to dry our waterproofs off.

Onwards to Tarleton, who were just finishing up their Harvest Service. A quick hello, cake and thoughtfully, we took hot drinks away with us in takeaway cups. I was particularly grateful for this hot drink as the heavens opened and gave us a cold shower as we walked.

Upon approach to Holmes, it was a competition as to which group made the most noise. Us and ELO arriving or Holmes Sunday School, who were stood on the church steps playing the percussion instruments, clapping and cheering as we approached. The welcome was warm, the cake/flapjacks were divine and hot coffee was the order of the day.



and yet more tea. We were at the halfway point. 10 miles down, 10 to go. Legs were starting to feel it but plenty of energy left. We departed to the tunes of Wham!

This leg was the furthest without any stops. Could we cope without cake? After a squally morning weather-wise, we enjoyed a settled period where the sun shone and our waterproofs could come off. At this point we were joined by some supporters to walk alongside us. Extra energy to keep us going at the three quarters stage.

As we arrived at Burscough from walking along the canal bank, I was unsure if I could manage anymore cake.....until I saw the homemade carrot cake waiting for us! Delicious! We were on the final straight. Nearly there.

Our motivation was fuelled not just by cake but by the donations that had been made to our Just Giving fund. I am not just talking about the ones that came in on the day, although it was heartening to see the total climb up each time the page



was refreshed. I am talking about the donations that have come in since day 1. For me, there were times when I did not want to get out there and train and then I'd see a donation and supportive message arrive and it always spurred me on.

It was 4.30pm, we'd been walking since 9am and we had just over 3 miles to complete. We straightened our tutu's, tightened our laces and set off with music and friends and headed along the A59. The sun was shining, spirits were high and then, just as we entered Burscough Road, heading to Ormskirk, the rain clouds burst and ensured we had a very soggy finish.

Did we care? Of course not! ELO's Mr Blue Sky belted out of the back pack and we arrived at Emmanuel at 5.30pm drenched but elated. 20 miles completed! (and a bit more)

Emmanuel members, family and friends had gathered. We were greeted with party poppers, balloons, hugs, music, refreshments and even aromatherapy foot spa's for the tired feet.

What an ending to an unforgettable day! What started as an idea ended with a life time memory. The day was filled with love.

The list of thanks is long. We can't thank the churches and members enough for their support on the day. Our timetable wasn't exact and we know folk had to be available to open churches and offer welcome and shelter.

We also give thanks to Upholland, Trinity Skelmersdale and Skelmersdale Ecumenical Centre whose buildings couldn't form part of our route but whose members have supported and cheered us.

We should all be proud of the total raised for MIND – At the time of writing, the total is approaching £3600 and we have topped £4000 with gift aid added.
