You, O LORD, keep my lamp burning; my God turns my darkness into light. Psalm 18:28

Father, there are days when we are lost and confused in the darkness around us.
Remind us today that You are all good, all light, and all love. You are the source of all strength.



Do you have any allergies?' the staff member in the café asked me. 'I'm lactose intolerant, 'I replied, 'I can't eat dairy.' 'And any actual allergies? Anything that could be life threatening?'

Back at home, I was reminded that I am allergic to labels. These descriptions that others – and ourselves – use to mark us out.

Now if you do have a food allergy, please do not think that I am making light of this.

But there is the real sense that labels can be life threatening. The long-term psychological damage resulting from these labels can prevent us from living the fullness of life that Jesus offers.

I'm talking about labels such as 'stupid', 'unlovable' and 'broken'. I was reminded

last week that the only label that God gives us is 'loved'. So how can we take this into our lives, when the world, and often ourselves, puts negative labels on us?

First of all, let's change our language. Let's try to catch ourselves when we hear our internal voice telling us we're a failure or not good enough. Let's pause and remind ourselves that we are loved.

And let's not use labels, because in doing so, we are continuing the pattern of excluding those we are labelling. When Jesus met the woman at Jacob's well, he didn't focus on the fact that she had been married five times and was currently cohabiting. He didn't label her as a divorcee or 'living in sin'. He offered her living water, to release her from the effect of labels.

Galatians chapter 5 tells us that we have been given gifts to help us to live well, ways of being that take us away from legalism and absolutism, and into God's heart for us. Such things as joy, patience, peace, kindness and gentleness. If we internalise these and make these who we are, and how we treat others, then we release ourselves from living with labels and judgements.

Here is the Message version of the passage:

Galatians 5:22-24

22-23 But what happens when we live God's way? He brings gifts into our lives, much the same way that fruit appears in an orchard—things like affection for others, exuberance about life, serenity. We develop a willingness to stick with things, a sense of compassion in the heart, and a conviction that a basic holiness permeates things and people. We find ourselves involved in loyal commitments, not needing to force our way in life, able to marshal and direct our energies wisely.

23-24 Legalism is helpless in bringing this about; it only gets in the way. Among those who belong to Christ, everything connected with getting our own way and mindlessly responding to what everyone else calls necessities is killed off for good—crucified.

In February I returned to Sri Lanka, my first favourite island after Britain! No voluntary work this year but visiting friends and projects that I have been involved with, and looking to setting up a new one.

By chance I was able to attend three significant events. The first organised by the World Methodist Council when the 2022 World Methodist Peace Award was made to Rev. Ebenezer Joseph, President of the Methodist Church Sri Lanka. This was in recognition of the work he has undertaken over many years to build peace and reconciliation, both during and since the civil war. The second was the opening of the South East Asia Methodist Conference-a lively and colourful occasion and thirdly the ordination of three of my former students at the Anglican Cathedral in Colombo.







The main event for me was the laying of the foundation stone (Literally) for the community hall at Bibile to which Emmanuel Church has made a significant donation. A joyous occasion!

Revd Sue and Revd Michael Woods are proving to be an exceptional ecumenical team and their Christian endeavours are making a difference in the school. Their work is 'bearing fruit' in the school and in the community.

Circuit Family & Schools' Worker News

Hello everyone,

Another update from me!

In January and February, I had an amazing time working with the children and staff in five primary schools across our circuit (Trinity St Michael's, Croston; Holmeswood; Burscough Bridge; Ormskirk CofE; & Mawdesley St Peters). These schools had taken up my offer of a full day's art workshop for their whole school on the theme of God's Love....

We began the day with collective worship led by myself; with songs, their school prayer, a story about The Three Trees (in which God's Love changes everything), and looking at some artwork images on the theme. I had differentiated these for each age group, and found images of art that used different techniques and media.


After discussing the different images and explaining the task for the day, the children returned to their class-rooms to start thinking of their ideas. I had asked them to reflect on what God's Love meant to them and to create their own piece of art based on this - so, not a class full of identical pictures....but their very own individual piece. In feedback from some of the staff, they'd thought this almost impossible or at least a daunting task. However, as you'll see from the 'Art Gallery', they are all most certainly very different.



The children sketched out their ideas, drafted their chosen image, and then created this on either A3 or A4 paper using a choice of paint, collage, oil pastels, charcoal or soft pastels. Some children were using a certain media for the first time...some children were reluctant artists at the start, feeling

that they didn't have a talent for it and wouldn't be able to produce anything great. The change in these children especially was wonderful to see: a sense of achieve-

















Across the five schools, around 750 children took part in the God's Love Art Day with fabulous feedback from the schools. I've received photographs of the artwork displayed in many of the schools, some have also displayed a selection in their local church and shown the children's artwork to parents and to governors.

So the message of God's Love has been spread to many!
